

SDUPS Member Profile - Bill Ring

Bill Ring's photos and videos, especially in our competitions, are an example of the high quality of photography demonstrated by our members. I asked Bill to share a little about himself for our members.

In 1989, Bill visited Cozumel and tried SCUBA diving for the first time. The next year he was certified in San Diego (YMCA) and bought a Nikonos so he could share with others the things he saw. Since that time, Bill has been traveling the world to dive and take underwater photos and videos of marine life and underwater scenes

Bill has enjoyed a life of wanderlust and has traveled the world extensively. He first visited Europe when he was 17 years old, buying a bicycle and staying in youth hostels for a little more than a month. In 1964 he returned to Europe and travelled for 5 months. He met his wife there and they were married in London. In 1969 He and his family (wife and 2 kids) returned to Europe, bought a VW camper and travelled for 14 months, driving about 25,000 miles from southern Morocco to Finland and eastern Turkey and everything in between. Since that time Bill has visited about 90 countries, including South Africa, Egypt, Ethiopia, Afghanistan, India, all of Southeast Asia, Peru, Bolivia and New Zealand

Bill's favorite dive location is the Philippines.

Eventually, Bill transitioned from his Nikonos film camera and into digital cameras. He presently shoots an Olympus TG-6, a Go Pro, and Panasonic ZS20 for video. He uses Sola 2500 for lighting. Bill made me laugh when he said that he likes to shoot subjects that are small and slow. He has also migrated from primarily still photography to video and says that capturing animal behaviors makes viewing more interesting.

I asked Bill what advice he would offer to photographers who want to improve and he said that it is important to practice with the equipment you own. He also mentioned how important good lighting is.

Bill has been a member of the San Diego Underwater Photographic Society since October 2005. During that period he has served the club as treasurer for five years. His photographs have earned him the Advanced Photographer of the Year in 2015 and 2016 and Video Photographer of the Year in 2016, 2017 and 2020. I also recall being at a SDUPS meeting where Bill was recognized for one of his awards, and he said, "If you don't enter, you can't win."

I really enjoyed talking to Bill about the places he has been and places he has dived. He remarked how traveling changes the way you see the world

and understand people. When we resume meeting in person, please find Bill and ask him where he has returned from and where he is going next. He is a warm and friendly guy and inspiring to talk with.
















Digital Darkroom - Mike Poirier


Digital Darkroom was something I did about ten years ago. I ran a series highlighting various editing projects using Photoshop Elements. Because there is some questions about what resolution competition images should be when submitted each month, I thought I would show how to do this using Photoshop Elements. The resolution requirements for still images are as follows: 16 x 9 - 1920 x1080

4 x 3 - 1024 x 768

STEP ONE: Open your image in Photoshop Elements. Click on the Image Tab.



STEP TWO: Click on Resize in the Image dropdown box. Then click on Image Size



STEP THREE: This is where the action takes place. In this example I'm using a 16 x 9 image. So in the Width window, I typed 1920. The Height will automatically change to 1080. This is because the check box on Constrain Proportions is checked.

You would do the same with a 4 x 3 image, except you would type in 1024 in the height window

FINISH: The last step is to click on the File tab and click on the Save As in the dropdown box and give your image a name and save in a folder you can remember and find it.

You will find this procedure in most image editing software.

Critter Corner

Trumpetfishes are three species of highly specialized, tubular-elongated marine fishes in the genus *Aulostomus*, of the monogeneric family **Aulostomidae**. The trumpetfishes are members of the order Syngnathiformes, together with the seahorses and the similarly built, closely related cornetfishes.

The generic name, *Aulostomus*, is a composite of two Greek words: *aulos*, meaning flute, and *stoma*, meaning mouth, because the species appear to have tubular snouts."Flutemouth" is another less-common name for the members of the family (although this word is more often used to refer to closely related cornetfishes of the family Fistulariidae).

Trumpetfishes are found in tropical waters worldwide, with two species in the Atlantic and one in the Indo-Pacific. They are mostly demersal reef-dwellers, where one species seems to prefer rocky substrate.

They are relatively large for reef fish, where they reach almost 1 m in length. Bodies of trumpetfish are elongated, rigid, and pike-shaped. Their dorsal and anal fins are closely adjacent to the tail, where individual dorsal spines reach midway towards the head region. Similar to most members of the order Syngnathiformes, the bodies of trumpetfish are inflexible, supported by interwoven struts of bone. A distinct trait of the family is their long, tubular snouts ending with somewhat nondescript jaws. Members of the family have the capability to expand their jaws quickly into a circular, gaping hole almost to the body's diameter when feeding.

Aulostomids are highly carnivorous fish. They stalk their prey by hovering almost motionlessly a few inches above the substrate, inching their way towards unsuspecting prey. Once close enough, they rapidly dart in and expand their jaws rapidly. Opening their tube-like mouths in quick succession creates a strong suction force, which draws prey straight into the mouth. Aulostomids are known to feed almost exclusively on small, schooling reef fishes.

While they have no commercial fisheries value, members of the family have been known to occasionally be found in the aquarium trade. Although not popular aquarium fish, they are common enough to have websites featuring instructions on keeping them in captivity.




